The new Library Services Strategy was adopted by the Library Board in March 2015 and presented to City Council in May 2015. 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SUMMER READING FUN!

In September 2015, over 2000 people converged on the Metrotown Civic Square to celebrate the joys of reading at Burnaby Public Library's 24th annual pancake breakfast and Summer Reading Club medal presentation ceremony. Almost 700 children proudly lined up to be presented with "Build It" medals for having completed at least 50 days of reading over the summer. This was the culmination of a laughter-filled morning of activities, which included: enjoying tasty pancakes flipped by Burnaby Food Services; listening to the cheerful Metropolitan Concert Band; playing parachute games and trying out the Imagination Playground with staff from Burnaby Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services; and having face-paint patiently applied by girls from the 10th Burnaby Pathfinders and St. Roch Rangers. Literacy Now and Rotary Coats for Kids were also on hand with great crafts and activities for the kids. By the end of September, over 2400 children received a medal, a great achievement for all those families who persisted with the reading habit all summer long.

BOOK A TRIP THIS SUMMER!

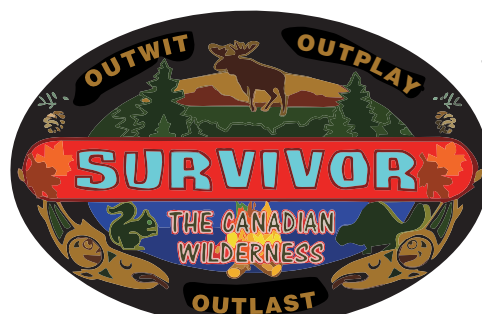

POP-UP LIBRARIES AND OUR NEW OUTREACH VEHICLE

Since 2014, our pop-up libraries – small satellite libraries we bring out into the community—have been well-received by visitors. We've created strong community partnerships and are able to reach citizens who can't always visit our branches. In 2015, we visited community centres and farmers' markets and took part in special community events around Burnaby.

The scope and reach of our pop-up libraries increased in 2015, due to the purchase of our new Outreach Vehicle late in the year. The addition of a vehicle equips and enables library staff to increase our activity and visit places in the community we haven't before.

The Outreach Vehicle also enables staff to reach the community in new and exciting ways: we've committed to offering 60 outreach visits in 2016 to commemorate our 60th anniversary. Watch for library staff and our outreach vehicle out in your community!

JULIA'S STUDIO

Julia Nelson served as Teen Services Librarian for Burnaby Public Library from 2010 – 2013. She lost her life in October 2013 after a six-month battle with leukemia.

A dedicated advocate for young adult collections and programs, Julia was deeply interested in teen literacy and believed that libraries were safe havens for teens to explore their interests. She enjoyed working in partnership with high schools and loved designing interactive programs for young adults to help them discover their abilities and talents. After receiving a generous donation in her memory, the library designed a series of engaging and creative session in 2014 to honour her spirit. We called it "Julia's Studio: Creative Workshops for Teens". 2015 was the second year we offered Julia's Studio. Teens gathered to publish multi-lingual eBooks, stop-motion animation videos, graphic novels, and theatre scripts around our theme "Be Courageous".

As each session was designed to be inclusive, expressive, and fun, Julia's Studio introduced a variety of creative expressions and artistic methods to participating teens. It also provided an opportunity for teens to connect positively with the library as well as their peers. Due to the positive feedback we heard from participants, we are pleased to offer Julia's Studio once again in Summer 2016.



The theme for this year's Julia's Studio is "You've Got the Write Stuff", focusing on the art of storytelling. Julia's Studio will be hosted at the Bob Prittie Metrotown Branch each Wednesday in July.
