SUBJECT: INDIGENOUS TERRITORY ACKNOWLEDGEMENT UPDATE

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT the Library Board review the following update regarding the Library's Indigenous territory acknowledgement.

<u>REPORT</u>

Background

Burnaby is located on ancestral, unceded, and shared Coast Salish territory, including the Katzie, Kwantlen, Kwikwetlem, Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh Nations. These are hənqəminəm speaking communities, with the exception of Squamish who speak Skwxwú7mesh.

In September 2019, BPL staff began using the following territory acknowledgment at the beginning of formal meetings, events, and programs:

"Before we start, I would like to take a moment to recognize we are on the ancestral and unceded homelands of the handaminam and Skwxwú7mesh speaking peoples, and to extend appreciation for the opportunity to hold a meeting on this shared territory."

The acknowledgment was developed by Burnaby Village Museum staff who worked closely with local Nations on the wording.

Update

Earlier this year, the word "shared" was removed from the acknowledgement's wording after further consultation with local Nations. The reason for this change is to respect the entirety of territory areas for each Nation. While Nations historically moved through the territories of other Nations on a seasonal round of hunting, harvesting and visiting relations, it is important when recognizing unceded territory to understand the land base

of each Nation as whole and complete, even when recognized boundaries overlap. This concept is supported by Action #47 of the TRC 'Calls to Action', which states "We call upon all levels of government to repudiate concepts used to justify European sovereignty over Indigenous peoples and lands".

At the same time, the acknowledgment became part of official staff email signatures. It is also now included in both internal and external library documents such as the strategic plan, annual report, 'welcome to the library' brochures, the new website and other external facing promotional material.
